HARITHKRAM

Harithkram, the Environment Society of Shaheed Bhagat Singh College was inaugurated by the eminent Environmentalist and Writer Padma Shri Sunita Narain on September 7, 2012. Its mission is to create Environmental Awareness and promote green and sustainable activities in and around the college. It develops and channelizes the creative ideas of young and potential environmentalists towards a greener world through individual efforts and team building.

The society focuses primarily on sensitizing the students on environmental issues. Our aim is to encourage students to showcase deep interest towards the environment and make Harithkram not just any other society, but a forum for constructive discussions and debates on a plethora of green causes. The society has been actively involved in participating in eco-campaigns organized by the Government of the NCT of Delhi.

Harithkram conducted India's first Model United Nations Environmental Assembly based on United Nations Environment Programme's United Nations Environment Assembly in the year 2014, and called it Harithkram Model United Nations Environmental Assembly (HMUNEA'14). It was organized at the S.P. Jain Auditorium, South Campus of the University of Delhi. The society also organized a two-day youth conference, Delhi University Sustainability Forum (DUSF) marking the golden jubilee year of the College on September 28-29, 2016 at India International Centre. The Conference also featured the second edition of HMUNEA. The focal theme of the conference was "Sustainable Development Goals-The Way Forward", and it provided a great platform for young environmentalists to discuss and deliberate on key environmental issues. The society's effort has also resulted in establishment of Herbal Garden in the college premises.

The society has continually made efforts for generating awareness regarding the environmental issues among the youth through celebrating various international movements (like Earth Hour, World Environment Day etc.) in the college premises. The students of the society also represented the College in the Inter University Competition on Water Resources Management (IUWRM) organised by The Energy and Resources Institute (TERI) and TERI University. It has also showcased its committed action to environmental sustainability (ground water recharging wells in College campus, recycling papers used during the DUSU elections, water and electricity audit) in the Annual University Festival of the University of Delhi Antardhvani'15 and various other platforms. Harithkram organized the third edition of HMUNEA on September 21-22, 2017 on the focal theme "Making Cities Sustainable" and the Delhi University Sustainability Forum 2018 on the focal theme "Environmental Sustainability: A Challenge?" on October 11-12. Harithkram proudly hosts the Delhi University Sustainability Forum (DUSF) and the Harithkram Model United Nations Environment Assembly (HMUNEA) every alternate year. This year, we mark the fourth edition of the Harithkram Model United Nations Environment Assembly on September 20-21, 2019.

This society is guided by the core conviction that young people are a powerful and untapped force that can bring about a positive change in their communities and nations. Such a force is essential to bring about a paradigm shift in our society. It is a medium for us to direct our unbounded zeal and energy towards making a healthy and stable society.

Model United Nations Environment Assembly (MUNEA) is an academic simulation of the United Nations Environment Assembly of the United Nations Environment Programme that aims to engage the participants in debates and discussions on pressing environmental issues in international relations, environmental diplomacy and the agenda of the United Nations pertaining to environmental causes.

The first session of the United Nations Environment Assembly (UNEA) of the United Nations Environment Programme was convened at the UNEP headquarters in Nairobi with more than 1200 participants, which included Environment Ministers, government delegates and representatives of major group and stakeholders. UNEA is a result of the call made by world leaders at the United Nations Conference on Sustainable Development (Rio+20), held in Brazil in June 2012 to strengthen and upgrade UNEP as the leading global environmental authority that would set the global environment agenda and establish universal membership in its Governing Council. Subsequently, at the first universal session of the UNEP Governing Council held in February 2013, member states suggested the UN General Assembly that the Governing Council, the governing body of UNEP in place since 1972, and comprising of 58 member states, be renamed as the United Nations Environment Assembly of the United Nations Environment Program with a universal membership. In March 2013, the General Assembly adopted the resolution A/RES/67/251, formally changing the designation of the Governing Council to the “United Nations Environment Assembly.” The first ever UNEA session took place from the 23-27 June, 2014, with a view to adopting an outcome that would spell out concrete actions to address key environmental challenges at hand.

It was indeed a historic event where environment took centre stage in the international community. Taking cue from UNEA, Harithkram started its journey of hosting HMUNEA in 2014 with a shared vision of setting up a path of environmental sustainability. This year, we eagerly await the **fourth edition of Model United Nation Environment Assembly on September 20-21, 2019**. This simulation of UNEA of United Nations Environment Programme offers young scholars from varied backgrounds a platform to brainstorm, debate and discuss on pressing environmental issues and concerns and make the discourse on environment richer and after plausible solutions to environmental problems under discussion.

It is a splendid opportunity for young voices to ensure a clean, green and fresh environment through intellectual discussions.

It will provide an extraordinary platform to those young ignited minds, who are passionate to work their grey cells up to deliberate on and create a discourse on some of the most intriguing issues pertaining to environment, energy and sustainability that confront the world today. Together, students engage in a lively debate searching for solutions to complex conundrums of contemporary international environmental politics and in so doing, hone and perfect their skills of debating and diplomacy.

Each delegate will represent a member state of the United Nations and he will present the position of his agency/country in light of the given agenda with an ultimate aim of passing a resolution that is broad and comprehensive enough to provide an adequate solution to the issue at hand, while at the same time being acceptable to as many member states as possible. In the interest of making the simulation realistic and credible, all delegates are expected to set aside, for the duration of the conference, their personal views on the issues, and to adopt the stance and attitude of the country they are representing. If realism is one pillar of UNEA simulation, then negotiations is certainly the second guiding principle.

During the sessions, great emphasis will be laid on conducting the discussions as professionally as possible. The procedural rules governing the debate are thus closely modelled on the lines of the actual United Nations Assembly with a few improvisations done to suit the requirement of the HMUNEA.

Thus, HMUNEA will try its best to keep up the spirit of the guiding principles set out by the founders of the United Nations in the Preamble of the Charter; which is “to produce tolerance and live together in peace with one another as good neighbours.”

This year, Harithkram Model United Nations Environment Assembly will be convened under the focal theme “**Environmental Diplomacy on Global Health**”.

CONCEPT NOTE

Global health diplomacy brings together the disciplines of public health, international affairs, management, law, and economics for negotiations, which influence and shape global policies on environment that are directed towards the attainment of better standards of health globally. The ever-changing dynamics of health, trade and foreign policy is at the cutting edge of global health diplomacy.

Pollution, or the introduction of different categories of waste materials in the environment, has adverse effects on the ecosystem from which we derive our sustenance. With the increase in pollution and environmental degradation, there is a global loss of the ecosystem that provides us clean air and water. The World Health Organization (WHO) explains that climate change caused by environmental degradation is already leading to poor global health. Data from the WHO concludes that as the world gets hotter and more crowded, our engines continue to emit harmful gases and radiation. To make matters worse, approximately half the world has no access to clean fuels or technologies like stoves, lamps etc.

The very air we breathe is growing dangerously polluted: nine out of ten people now breathe in polluted air. Air pollution kills 7 million people every year. An alarming one-third of deaths due to stroke, lung cancer, and heart diseases are also caused by air pollution. On the other end of the spectrum, water-borne diseases account for the deaths of 3,575,000 people a year. Every year, 1 billion people suffer sickness caused by unclean water. The horror story doesn't end here: 23% of all premature deaths around the world have been attributed to environmental factors. Moreover, low-income communities are at a disproportionate risk because their homes are often closest to the most polluting industries.

The aforementioned problems are estimated to worsen in the coming years if the world does not wake up to these grim realities. They are already being deliberated upon and debated in discussions on world health.

We humans are primarily responsible for causing pollution, and we will suffer the consequences if we do not stop! We already see its effects manifested in global warming, contaminated seafood, increased cases of lung diseases and so on. While death from floods, extreme temperatures, asthma and respiratory diseases are growing in tandem with spiralling air pollution, diarrheal diseases, malaria, and malnutrition are being increasingly linked to environmental degradation and climate change. Many infectious diseases spreading through contaminated water are also on the rise. Common water-borne diseases like typhoid, cholera, paratyphoid fever, dysentery, jaundice, amoebiasis and malaria continue to affect people all over the world.

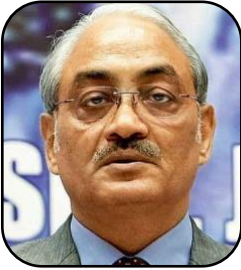
People in developing countries are reeling under an even greater burden of diseases and poor health. However, a million-dollar question is, what improvements can be suggested/made to regulations to ensure better environmental conditions and overall health of citizens?

We live in an ecosystem where the action of one has the potential to affect many. This can either prove to be a favourable advantage or an awful curse depending on what the step taken is. It is high time we wake up and not only own up to our mistakes (or those of our predecessors), but also try to reverse the damage done to the environment to the best of our potential. One way in which we can begin to inch towards the greater good of the environment and humanity is by making global health diplomacy take centre stage in diplomatic discussions and policy-making on world platforms. If we do not begin to work collectively on the environment today on strong international forums, the road ahead is going to be impossible to tread on. For us to be able to notice any change in the environmental and health conditions of humankind in our lifetimes, we need to begin today!

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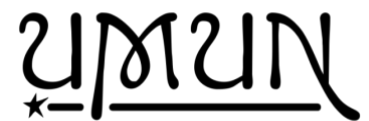
